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


Successes and Aspirations

Congress: Take bold action NOW

- \$3.5 trillion to Build Back Better: What's in it?
- Net budget: Funded by progressive taxes and drug price negotiations
- WA has made significant progress but enormous gaps remain

Federal budget timeline

- High level budget resolution passed Senate & House
- Committee deadline: THIS Wednesday, Sept. 15
- Budget Committee: Week of Sept. 20
- * Reconciliation package final votes:
 - House Vote: End of September
 - Senate Vote: By end of the year?





Spotlight on seven key health policy priorities

- 1. Negotiate drug prices

1. Allow the federal government to negotiate drug prices

Negotiating drug prices:

- Lowers drug costs for patients
- Has strong bipartisan and public support
- Could save \$400 \$530 billion over the next 10 years
- Presents a key funding mechanism for the rest of the package


Based on HR 3 – Lower Drug Costs Now Act



2. Expand Medicare to include dental, vision, and hearing

Dental, vision, and hearing benefits are essential to comprehensive health care, but are currently not provided in traditional Medicare coverage.

- Nearly two-thirds of Medicare beneficiaries lack dental coverage due to the high cost.
- Low-income seniors are much less likely to access vision and hearing care than their higher income or younger counterparts.




3. Make the ARPA subsidies permanent

Making ARPA's subsidy enhancements permanent would decrease the number of uninsured people by up to 4.2 million and enable more than 5 million people to enroll in subsidized marketplace coverage

4. Close the Medicaid coverage gap

Over **2 million low-income, disproportionately Black people** in the 12 non-expansion states still lack access to any realistic option to receive affordable health insurance.



5. Target maternal health disparities

 Permanently expand postpartum Medicaid benefits for low-income women and birthing parents to one year after birth in every state, and more (<u>Black Maternal</u> <u>Health Momnibus Act</u>)

6. Invest in home & community-based services

- More than 800,000 people are currently on waiting lists
- Allowing seniors and people with disabilities to remain at home improves quality of life and saves families and the federal government millions of dollars

7. Expand health care to immigrants

The HEAL Act and Lift the Bar Act, would ensure access to health care for lawfully present immigrants through Medicaid and enable undocumented people to purchase coverage on the marketplace
